Education in Wee Waa 1870 to 1995

Wee Waa Public provides education for 250 pupils

Wee Waa Public School has a pupil enrolment of 250 students.

There are nine classes with small numbers in most of them.

The school is well resourced with additional support staff - a Support Teacher (Learning Difficulties), a Literacy and Numeracy teacher Years 3-6, a K-1 Initiative teacher and a Reading Recovery person.

Special features of our school include a spacious, well cared for playground, shade areas and excellent playground equipment.

The classrooms are well resourced, including the latest computer technology of CD roms.

The large, spacious library has been completely refurbished this year. It is computerised, has a satellite dish for access to many additional programs, and the provisions to access the "Internet".

The school is very progressive in the curriculum offered to our students, as well as in our teaching practice. An emphasis is placed on teaching the basic skills of literacy and numeracy.


Special programs include Peer Support, Reading Recovery, Gifted and Talented program, CAP Instrumental Music, Korean Lote, Interest Week.

The children are involved in many extra curriculum activities such as Dance Festival, Tourna-

ment of the Minds, Cultural shows, Special days, Academic Challenge, State Knockouts, sporting events at district, regional and state levels.

We believe in teaching the traditional values of taking responsibility, caring for others, valuing our heritage showing respect, and encouraging leadership.

Above all, we hope to instill in our students a love of learning.

SPORTS NEWS



Saxon Holland for Narrabri L.A.'s was outstanding, winning four of his five events and becoming the Under Nine champion.



Wee Waa Public School (Erected 1884)


Pictured right, Wee Waa Public School in 1874. The history of public education in Wee Waa will be in focus at the commemorative dinner on November 11.
